Activity Tie a Bowline Blindfolded

Date

27/4/2020

Aim/Activity and Instructions.

We revisit this useful knot form March, but want to see if you can tie it blindfolded. This will test your memory and competence.

Learn how to tie the knot and what it is used for. – Do it outside – around a tree or any fixed object perhaps.

History

Although first mentioned in the 1961 book, A Sea Grammar by John Smith, it is well known that the knot has ancient origins within sailing. It was used to hold the edge of a sail in square rigged boats. Most amazing is that it was discovered on the rigging of a solar ship belonging to Egyptian pharaoh Khufu who was believed to have been alive between 2589-2566 BC!

Uses

The Bowline (Boh-Lin) is most commonly used to secure boats to mooring and within sailing rigs. However, it is also used in rescue operations as a harness on a rope, tying banjo strings, hanging hammocks, tying horses and many more.

How to:

- Make a loop in the rope and pass the end of the rope through the loop from the bottom (Figure 1)
- 2. Pass the end of the loop behind the other part of the rope and then poke it back through the loop (figure 2)
- 3. Pull the end of the rope whilst holding the loop to tighten (figure 4)

Learning rhyme: Up through the rabbit hole, round the big tree, down through the rabbit hole and off goes he! — The loop (Step 1) is the rabbit hole, the end of the rope is the bunny and the standing end (rope end coming from below the loop) is the tree.

Advantages:

- Does not slip under load
- Fast and easy to untie
- Does not jam


Disadvantages:

- If there is weight on the rope it cannot be untied
- Without additional knots it is unsuitable for climbing purposes due to its ease of untying

Challenges:

1. Can you tie it with 1 hand?

Learning Outcomes:

Tying knots, following instructions, be resourceful.

Resources:

Find some rope or string, or your dressing gown belt will do.

Key Risk and Controls:

If going outside your home, take an adult with you.

Work with a short length of rope and be careful not to get tangled in it.
